Amy Kay and I gazed over the crowd on Sunday morning as we sang the processional hymn and said, "This is the way worship ought to be!" The sanctuary was nearly filled, the voices were lifted together booming the words to "Gather Us In" and our spirits were soaring!

In front of the pulpit were two rows of charter members of Broadway Christian Church sitting in the same pews where they sat on that October Sunday morning in 1958 when they were commissioned to leave First Christian Church and begin a new Disciples of Christ congregation on the western side of the city. In front of the lectern were three rows of people who had come back to share in a reunion of the Friendship Class, representing the vital ministry of adult education which has long characterized our congregation.

Farther back on the south side were several members of the former Christian Student Congregation who had come back to the place where they shared life together during their college days in Columbia. Scattered throughout the sanctuary were people who had come home to share in reunions with their families. One young woman who had come to share the day with her grandfather beamed when she told me, "We filled our pew today!" And there were a couple of people who are not able to get to church as much as they would like, but who told me they wouldn't miss it. And there were all the rest of us who continue to make this place our home, sharing together a joyous day of homecoming with all the others.

And after the benediction was pronounced, soon the Fellowship Hall was filling up with handshakes and hugs, and talking and laughing as we gathered around the tables for a feast of friendship and food. It looked like we were going to run out of room, but when people were asked to make room at their tables, everyone found a place to sit, and new friendships began to emerge as people began making acquaintances.

That's the way church ought to be! People lifting their voices in great worship and feasting together around tables! What a joy it was to share "Coming Home Sunday." There are so many people to thank, and their names are mentioned in the 175th anniversary article included with this issue of the VISITOR. But one name is missing, and that is the name of the person who wrote that article, and who, of course, would not mention herself, and that is Genie Rogers. When I asked her more than a year ago to head the committee to plan the 175th anniversary celebration she took the bull by the horns, recruited a blue ribbon committee and went to work. And she has been working all year long! Here is a special thanks to you, Genie, for everything you have done to make this a great year, and especially to make "Coming Home Sunday" such a great day! Along with the flowers in the chancel last Sunday morning placed there in your honor, we celebrate all your hard work and faithful support of First Christian Church.

There was a spread of delicious breakfast delicacies, juices and coffee. All seemed to enjoy the chance to get together once again and renew their friendships. All were delighted to welcome back Ed Coffman, their beloved Minister during the 40's and 50's.

Both services had the pleasure of hearing a very good and thought provoking sermon from Rev. David Yonker. It seems like a very short time ago that he was in the Rock Bridge band. Somewhere along the way he has grown up! We are proud to have him as an FCC Timothy.

Following church Fellowship Hall quickly filled up with a joyful crowd. Following the Invocation by Rev. John Yonker, two buffet serving lines at two tables quickly filled their plates. Throughout the 20th century the role of the Assistant Ministers has been important in the lives of each of us and each associate has left their own legacy and imprint on the future of the church. This will be a well-timed addition to make our historical record more complete.

Christian Student Congregation (CSC)

First Christian Church had a popular young and visionary minister during the 1920's named Walter M. Haushalter. He viewed the students as a local underserved population and spearheaded the beginnings of The Christian Student Congregation (CSC), "to advance the cause of Christ and his church, and to inspire students to Christian leadership". In 1921, one hundred charter members created their own constitution and elected officers. The group usually met at the Bible College, with Sunday classes and worship services at the church. Other activities were held at Christian College and Parker Funeral Chapel. During the early years CSC shared special worship services and service programs with the Church.

When Dr. C. E. Lemmon arrived at First Christian in 1930, the CSC staff position was "Assistant to the Pastor" and included many leadership duties in the church's ministry as well as directing the CSC program. A description of CSC during the late depression years: "Guest speakers presented programs on Sunday mornings and Sunday evenings. Programs featured discussion groups. One series included letters written by the young men and ladies on the qualities desirable in a wife or husband. The group then discussed the general social problems of marriage."

In 1942 students published the first alumni bulletin for servicemen and friends. Emphasis was also placed on letter writing and copies of daily devotions sent to servicemen and women. In Columbia CSC'ers presented worship services to cancer patients and to inmates in the county and city jails.

G. Parker Rossman was named assistant to the pastor and director of CSC in September, 1942. During his two years as CSC director, he strengthened the organization and activities of CSC.

During World War II student attendance became largely women students, but that changed drastically when war veterans swarmed back onto the campus. They brought in a more mature and experienced leadership. Attendance quickly grew to more than a hundred each Sunday night, plus a big Sunday School class. In order to give more students a chance to lead, officers were elected for a semester rather than a school year, and students were divided into four teams. Each week one team prepared the Sunday evening meal, one cleaned up afterwards, one did the program, the fourth did the table decorations and recreation. Bus loads went to student regional and national Christian conferences.

With the return of servicemen to Columbia, CSC enjoyed some of its greatest years and the number of Christian Church preference students at the three schools jumped to over 2000.

Ed Coffman arrived in Columbia in 1946. He was described in the 1950 CSC Yearbook as the one who "deserved a large part of the credit for CSC's success". Ed was also highly respected by First Church, and his title was changed to Associate Pastor in 1947.

The Sunday evening program continued to grow. CSC had a supper each Sunday night in Fellowship Hall, prepared and served by the students for a cost of \$.25. The meal was followed by fellowship,

singing, a brief worship service and a program, often given by well-known teachers in the schools and leaders in the community. After the program the tables and chairs were pushed aside for an hour or more of dancing, something which was quite an attraction for the students. Cleanup in the kitchen followed every meal where many romances developed as a result of the hours spent washing dirty dishes.

The Christian Student Congregation was well organized. There were new officers each semester and several functional committees. A budget was developed with pledges from students and income from their projects. By the end of Ed Coffman's tenure, he left behind an annual budget of \$4,000. A weekly paper the CSC'er was mimeographed and distributed each Sunday. A CSC Sunday School class was part of the Church School program.

The Sunday evening programs were always well planned. Several times during the year a special series of programs was widely advertised. The two most popular series were on Courtship and Marriage and on Church and Politics. Popular speakers were secured to have dialogue with the students.

Every fall and spring a retreat was held at the Lake of the Ozarks. Each retreat would have 175-200 students. Buses were rented and lodging was at one of the camps at Lake Ozark State Park. Each camp included an assembly hall and dining room along with a number of cottages. It was rustic with no heat and electricity in the cottages. Students brought their bedrolls and cooked and served the meals. The weekend included lots of recreation, time for morning devotionals, Sunday worship with communion and always an invited speaker. Chaperones were members of the church. Frequent dependable and popular chaperones were Don and Thelma Brooker. A printed program was prepared of 16 or so pages which included worship services and devotionals, songs, and material about the speakers.

When Ed accepted a call to become pastor at Kirksville, his replacement was Eldon Drennan, a former member of CSC during Ed's leadership. Eldon credited Ed's influence as one of the main reasons he went into the ministry.

The Drennan family arrived in Columbia, July 1958. Eldon wrote 2,200 letters to students identified by the colleges and university as Christian Church preference students. Several hundred students dropped by CSC's Open House on the first Friday night of the new year, and Sunday October 10, 1958 sixty-two students took student membership with FCC. Dr. Lemmon insisted on shaking each person's hand at the close of services.

The organizational structure of CSC changed little during the 1950s and 1960s. Two programs that remained popular over the years included weekend fall and spring retreats at the Lake of the Ozarks and formal banquets, the Anniversary Banquet in December and the Recognition Banquet in April. Shorter overnight local retreats of study and fun were held at the old Girl Scout cabin, at the Stephens College Retreat Center, and at Olivet Christian Church.

The retreats began on Friday afternoon with a bus ride to the Lake, a late snack supper, a guest speaker, recreation and late

vespers. The Saturday schedule was relaxed with speakers and fun. Sunday morning included a more formal worship service with students in charge, a fun-filled afternoon and the trip back to Columbia.

The banquets provided a more formal sharing, the meal and cleanup provided by the women of the church, special music, and skits with a top speaker from the church community. The fall banquet celebrated CSC's past and the spring event honored the two outstanding CSC'ers for the year.

Student involvement in church programs dropped precipitously as the Vietnam War enlarged. Students at nearly every higher education institution turned their efforts into anti-war activity. Church attendance dropped and never really returned. High school students were also engaged in anti-war activity and fewer came to college having been active in the Christian Youth Fellowship and Sunday School at home. Another change in our student ministry came when Christian College stopped requiring students to attend church each Sunday.

With the departure of Rev. Eldon Drennan in 1971, ministerial oversight for CSC fell to Rev. Sam Nickols. Sam, his wife Sharon, and their four children, opened their home for a number of CSC activities. The family also joined the group on outings, such as camping and float trips.

Despite the reduced number of participants due to societal and university changes, an active core continued to meet on Sunday mornings for study and discussion, on Wednesday evenings for volleyball, vespers and fellowship and on Friday afternoons at the MU Student Union for a spirited discussion. CSC'ers also continued to publish a monthly newsletter mailed to students on all three campuses. The group also planned and led the annual college worship service for the congregation.

Bob Priddy, CSC member during the 60's, recalls many church sponsored softball, basketball and church league touch football teams, working late nights in the old CSC office typing, and running off the group's Sunday morning newspaper, and living in the CSC annex at 508 South 9th, called by some "East Jesus Tech". The bonding of these students was so strong that they have maintained contact through yearly retreats at the Lake of the Ozarks each fall since getting out of school. With numbers dwindling of those left, the last of these reunions was held September 2007. In the future the reunions will be a one day get-together here at the home church in Columbia.

Amy Kay Pavlovich has had the privilege of attending the CSC retreat for the past several years and delivered the vespers this fall for the group. The older CSC'ers think of and pray for the current college group often. They very much want the type of experience that they had at "First Church" to continue to be had by students today. Thanks be to God for the opportunity to try!
