Sunday Services

This Sunday, May 27th is Pentecost Sunday. Pentecost is the seventh Sunday after Easter Sunday and is symbolically related to the Jewish festival of Shavuot which is celebrated 50 days after Passover. This important day commemorates the descent of the Holy Spirit upon the Apostles and the followers of Jesus as described in Acts 2. Our scripture reading will be verses 1-21 of this text, but will be acted out by five of our own thespians. Many people will be a part of the worship service this Sunday in an effort to bring in various voices as the winds blew and the flames descended upon many in the scripture. Mary Bancroft and Norma Miller will play piano and organ duets and our Chancel Choir will sing "Gracious Spirit, Dwell With Me" directed by MU Graduate Student, Lindsey Lang. What might it mean that many people were speaking in their own language and could actually be heard and understood by one another... come and consider this with fellow Christians this Sunday morning!

Next Sunday, June 3, our worship service will be focused on the Revised Common Lectionary texts of Psalm 8 and Romans 5:1-5. Our nine all-church mission trippers will have arrived home from the Yakama Nation in Washington the evening before worship so that John will be back with us. We will enjoy piano duets by Jean Hall and Mary Bancroft and the Chancel Choir will sing "All Things Bright and Beautiful."

From The Land Beyond the Workroom...

Columbia is such a great town. There are good things to do and see all the time! Our wise organist, Mary Bancroft, has said that when we have to make decisions about what to do and consequently what not to do, we aren't picking between good/bad options. We have to pick between competing goods in our town. I hear this sentiment from friends in the church when they tell me why they are not able to worship or take part in some happening. Believe me, we understand! The same good things play tug-of-war in our lives as ministers and we have to pick between the goods as well.

Our hope is that you find worship and other events at the church to be meaningful and helpful as you navigate complicated daily decisions. It is from our God-centered world view that we can base our decision making. In my mind, the only way to be centered is to worship, study, be involved in mission work and take part in a community of believers. We know that the summertime is busy but hope that you can make your faith life a priority because it is the lens for *all* of life.


Hopefully one of the good things that you are choosing to do this summer is travel on a mission trip. Important to our faith development is the act of getting outside of ourselves and considering what it means to be a Christian among different populations of people. We can serve all year around here in Columbia – and do. But there is something special about going away and opening ourselves up to a different place in God's world and to a different group of God's people.

When on the college mission trip last week to Humane Borders in Tucson, Arizona, we looked into the scared, sad eyes of the migrant worker and she became real to us. We understand that she is just a person who wants to be able to survive. She wants to work so that her little six month old "Bruno" can continue to live and be healthy. When we saw a truck load of migrant men being hauled across the desert by a "Coyote," we understood that not all undocumented workers are violent, drug smugglers. They are men who look like our brothers or uncles. When we filled water barrels in the desert, we more fully realized that water is life giving and the lack of it kills hundreds of migrants each year, and the numbers of the

dead are only increasing as circumstances become more desperate. When we visited a "Just Coffee" cooperative, we realized that a fair payment of goods can sustain people so that they don't have to migrate to provide for their families. When we understood the complexities of border issues more fully, we could think and will continue to ponder how we can live out our Christian faith to improve conditions for everyone.

So, come along and worship this summer with your fellow brothers and sisters in Christ... and live out your faith for our brothers and sisters across the world.

Higher Education and Leadership Ministries

The Christian Church has a long history of support for higher education. Between 1836 and 1986, Disciples founded 209 colleges and universities and a total of 485 educational institutions of all types. Among those is Columbia College, formerly known as Christian College, founded in 1851 by members of our congregation.

The first general ministry relating to higher education was created in 1894 as the Board of Education. In 1910 the Association of Colleges was founded; in 1914 it became the Board of Education and in 1938 the church created the Board of Higher Education of the Christian Church.

Beginning in the late 1960s, board president Dr. William L. Miller, Jr., set the board on a new vision of ministry. In March 1977, under Miller's guidance, the 77-member board voted to support a reorganization that led to the creation of a special unit of the church dedicated to the nurturing of higher education institutions. By October the Division of Higher Education was official, with Dr. D. Duane Cummins serving as first president.

In the spring of 2004 the Board of Directors voted to change the name to the Division of Higher Education and Leadership Ministries (HELM). "Before anything else, we are a ministry of the whole church focused on nurturing leaders for a faithful future," President Dennis Landon said of the name change. "We will continue our work with and on behalf of Disciples educational institutions and campus ministries.... We want to do everything in partnership with other institutions and ministries." Currently, HELM is affiliated with 17 universities and colleges and 10 theological institutions.

Associate Minister Amy Kay Pavlovich serves on the Board of Directors of HELM, and is Chair of its Council on Ministries in Higher Education. It has been a custom for the senior minister to serve on the Board of Columbia College (Christian College). Dr. Sam Langley was a trustee in the 80s and Dr. John Yonker continues the tradition.

Disciples Home Missions (DHM) Formerly known as Division of Homeland Ministries

Disciples Home Missions (DHM) is one of the general ministries of the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) supported by Disciples of Christ congregations in the United States and Canada.

DHM has roots in the historic missionary societies developed by the Disciples of Christ in the late 1800's to support foreign and home missions, benevolent care of children and older adults, and retired ministers. By 1920 their work was brought together in the creation of the United Christian Missionary Society (UCMS). In the 1960's when the denomination restructured, the UCMS divided into the Division of Overseas Ministries for work abroad and the Division of Homeland Ministries for work at home. DHM now leads the work of the church in areas such as Family, Refugee & Immigration, Racial/Ethnic Ministries, Women, Men, Ministerial Placement, Christian Education, Youth, and Evangelism.

The Disciple Home Missions has supported historic home mission centers among Hispanics in San Antonio, Texas; Native Americans in Yakama, Washington; diverse inner city populations in Los Angeles; and the rural poor in Kentucky. In the last five years youth and adults from our congregation have taken mission trips to three of these four sites growing to love and appreciate each of them. Our college students have twice been to the Yakama Christian Mission to work, and on May 26th a team of First Christian Church adults will work at Yakama to continue our partnership in that community.

Earlier this year DHM announced that all funding to their historic mission centers would be eliminated because of a budget crunch. Regardless, we continue to be committed to supporting the work of our historic Disciple Home Mission sites.

Disciple Amateur Radio Fellowship

Shortwave radio has been a lifeline for isolated Christian mission centers in remote parts of the world without other modern means of communication. In 1958 three individuals, one being Earl Ebbe, a member of our congregation, founded the Disciples Amateur Radio Fellowship.

DARF is an official church agency that works closely with our denominational Division of Overseas Ministries and its partner United Church of Christ Global Missions and U-CAN (UCC equivalent to DARF). DARF has established radio "rigs" at 63 locations in nine countries. Local volunteers are trained how to operate and maintain the equipment.

Before DARF, the Congo relied on messengers on foot to cover long distances or to paddle canoes to reach another place. The shortwave radios and their networks shortened the time from days and weeks to immediate communication with other stations and global mission offices in Indianapolis.

Typically, a special appeal is made to fund a radio project, which often costs \$20,000. Administrative and the "Missionaire" newsletter cost no more than about \$500 a year. Most work is donated. DARF receives no Disciple Mission Fund money but relies on voluntary support.

The advanced technologies of today open up new communication possibilities with our missionaries. There continues to be a tremendous need for very basic communication services that DARF provides for people in underdeveloped regions.

Christian Women Lead The Way

On an April morning in 1874, an Iowa minister's wife, Caroline Pearre, wrote pleading letters to key women in six states. Concerned that Disciples were doing little for missions, she encouraged these women to start women's missionary societies in local Christian Churches. One of the women she wrote was **Mrs. J. K. (Jennie) Rogers**, who had been a student and friend when Mrs. Pearre taught at Christian College and attended First Christian. Jennie, an active member of First Christian and wife of the president of Christian College, was a "shaker and mover." She immediately wrote a letter urging Missouri women to respond to Mrs. Pearre's call to missions. Women's missionary circles were formed in many local churches.

In October of that year Jennie Rogers attended the Disciples General Convention in Cincinnati. She was one of 75 pioneering women who, with Mrs. Pearre, organized the Christian Woman's Board of Missions (CWBM). Upon returning home, she called together women and organized the Missouri CWBM and subsequently the local chapter in Columbia. She was elected the first president. She also served a term as president of the Missouri CWBM beginning in 1887.

Her husband, J. K. Rogers, whom she married in 1855, served as one of the ministers of First Christian as well as teacher and president of Christian College. As a minister's wife, she was involved in many aspects of church work. When the church was raising money for a building fund in 1890, Mrs. Rogers and Mrs. T. S. Gordon chaired a committee to serve meals at a Methodist camp meeting. Thousands of people attended, and proceeds from the Christian Church food tent were added to the church's building fund. (Incidentally, J. K. Rogers was the great, great uncle of current member Genie Rogers.)

Most members of First Christian in the early 1900s remember **Lizzie Morris** for her interest in Christian education. She was one of only two women appointed to serve on the Sunday school committee in 1906. In 1919 she pledged the first \$10,000 to erect a new building designed primarily for religious education and for recreational facilities for youth. But, the high cost of building materials delayed building until 1929. The church parlors in the new building were named for Lizzie Morris' son, Brinkley, who died in an automobile accident. In 1934, she was among seven women from First Christian to be honored at the state convention for 50 years of membership in CWBM.

At the time Lizzie Morris was active in CWBM, organizational changes took place on the national level. In 1919 the CWBM merged with other Disciple missionary societies to form the United Christian Missionary Society (UCMS). On the local level, all church-related women's organizations became the Women's Council. **Mrs. A. C. (Clara) Ragsdale**, who was active in the State Woman's Missionary Society, served as president of the local Women's Council from 1932-1936. Clara was also knowledgeable about the Bible and a gifted teacher. She taught the Mother's Class and the Edith Parker Class for many years. She served on the Church Board, was one of the first women elders, and worked in many other areas. In the 1950s Clara brought recognition by being elected to the Board of Trustees of the UCMS in Indianapolis. Clara remained active in

the life of First Christian until her death in 1973. Her daughter, Ruth Ragsdale, is currently active in First Christian.

A decade after Clara Ragsdale served as president of the Women's Council, **Mrs. Mac (Hannah) Jones** took the reins from 1941 to 1946. Hannah had come to Columbia with her husband, a professor at the University of Missouri. When Dr. Jones was offered a prestigious position at Ohio State, he turned it down, saying the couple was too involved in First Christian to move. When the Women's Council became the Christian Women's Fellowship in 1949, Hannah continued to be a strong leader. She organized a Young Matron's Circle, which may have evolved into today's Coffman-Watson Group. Traditionally, CWF groups were named for missionaries and later for ministers and their wives, but because Hannah Jones was so intricately involved in the life of CWF and First Christian, a circle was named for her in 1960. She had a profound influence on younger families; she set up a primary department and for many years served as the superintendent of the preschool department and the church nursery. She served on many committees, including the retirement reception for Dr. Lemmon, on the church board, and was an elder. She died in 1985 but her influence lives on through the Hannah Jones CWF Group. Her granddaughter, Becky Sinclair Bramon and husband Kerry, recently re-united with First Christian Church.

The International Christian Women's Fellowship (ICWF) was organized at a convention in 1953. Among outstanding leaders of the ICWF was **Mrs. Ivan (Lucille) Cole**, who retired to Lenoir in 1979 and became active at First Christian. Lucille, a fourth generation Disciple educated at Hiram College, had been assistant pastor at Lakewood Christian Church in Cleveland. This was Moray Loring Kiehl's home, and Moray considers Lucille as her mentor. Serving on many Disciple boards and ecumenical organizations, Lucille was president of the ICWF Quadrennial from 1961-1966 and brought invaluable experience to First Christian. Upon her death in 1998, Lucille left her estate to First Christian to enhance development of women through CWF and to assist with youth mission trips. Thus, her influence at First Christian continues today.
